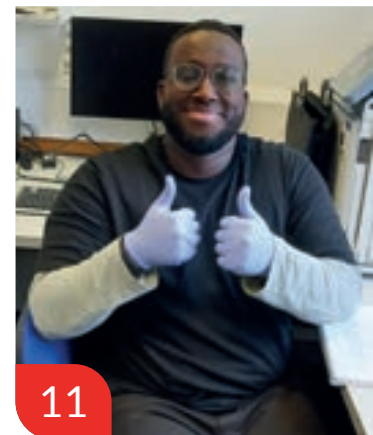
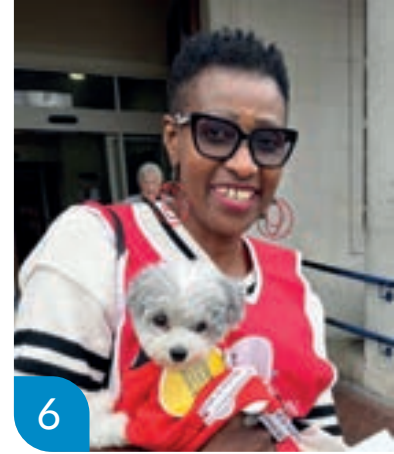

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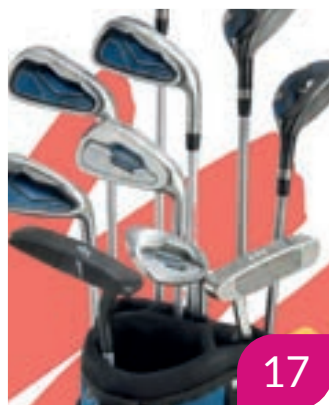
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Renal Unit

Another busy few months have flown by, the days are getting longer, the sun has finally decided to show its face and Spring is most definitely here. Sometimes working in the NHS feels like being in Narnia with a permanent winter (although unlike the inhabitants of Narnia, we do get Christmas to brighten it up). So called 'winter pressures' fill our Emergency Departments and our corridors. Staff and patients get caught in a cycle of seasonal viruses, and our wards and outpatients are like the magic porridge pot – overflowing despite our best efforts! Nevertheless, every year when spring arrives, moods lift and, at least from my perspective, it seems that there is a more positive and hopeful vibe. Whilst the science that says sunlight makes you happier is not as robust as some would claim, for me at least, the effects of sunshine on Vitamin D and Serotonin production are definitely beneficial.

Being positive helps to reflect on all the things we have achieved, rather than the endless list of things still to do. We are all very aware that St Helier is an old building, designed for healthcare more than 85 years ago. We were deeply disappointed when our ambitions for a new Renal Unit were 'paused' last

year as the current hospital environment is challenging for patients and staff. Of course a pause is intended to be temporary but at the moment, the future of any new build is still uncertain. Nevertheless, in effort to make the best of it, we have re-organised our inpatient beds and staffing. We know how

cramped some of our ward areas are, and with a bit of creativity and a lot of hard work, we have made changes to improve the use of the space that we have.

Our dialysis units are also continually on our road map of 'things to do'. Despite lots of innovation with medications to reduce the rate at which kidneys fail (and therefore reduce the number of people who reach the need for dialysis), as our population ages, we do see more health conditions which impact on kidney function, and the need for dialysis continues to grow. Next up, in terms of satellite dialysis units, is reprovision of the Kingston site in a different location. I remember when the Kingston Dialysis Unit was brand new and shiny. Like everything, age and use take their toll, and a new centre is long overdue. We are also exploring options for the Crawley satellite unit – currently

full and with local people having to travel further afield to dialyse. A bigger unit will resolve this, but we are still in the early stages of this project.

In addition, we have been in conversation with our colleagues at Frimley Health to discuss what future renal services in West Surrey might look like. We know that many of you are a significant distance from our main site, and that transport links are not easy. Ultimately, we want to be able to provide more of our service closer to where people live. Not surprisingly, we are competing with others for space and resource, but Dr Dave Evans, Clinical Lead for Renal at our Frimley hub, is passionate about making this happen and – supported by our St Helier leadership team – is working tirelessly on this project.

Of course it isn't just about the buildings. The people who work in, and the people who use our service are just as important. The annual PREM survey has given us food for thought. The teams working in different areas of the service have identified

three areas each where you have said we could do better, and have put together action plans for change. We hope that later this year we will genuinely be able to say 'You said, we did' and that this will be reflected in the annual PREM survey for 2026. We have also taken the same approach with our Staff Survey. Different teams have different challenges, but team leaders have been tasked with identifying areas where they can make a difference, and then effecting change. We know that in healthcare, happy staff make good teams, and good teams provide safe care.

In other news, our staff continue to make us proud. Our team of Interventional Nephrology Consultants and Peritoneal Dialysis Consultants continue to make their mark on the national renal community, teaching, training and mentoring staff from other renal units so that they can develop their interventional and peritoneal dialysis skills. Many of our team remain closely involved in research, a cornerstone

for medical progress, and we are always well represented at national and international meetings. But perhaps the staff member that I am most proud of at this moment in time is Anne Hurley, one of our current Transplant Nurse Specialists. I think it is fair to say that, unlike me, Anne would not class herself as a runner. However, having thrown her hat in the ring to run the London Marathon in support of St Raphael's Hospice, I think she is now, whether she likes it or not (!), most definitely a runner! To take on an event like this takes a huge amount of preparation, physical effort, and mental toughness. Anne tells me that she has hated every minute of the preparation – I hope she enjoys the race though. There is something about the crowds that – just like spring sunshine – lifts the mood. By the time this is in print, I suspect Anne's race will be over (and maybe her running shoes will be firmly at the back of the cupboard?) – but in the meantime

World Kidney Day 2026

On 12 March, the Renal team marked the 20th annual World Kidney Day event by hosting vibrant information stands at St Helier, Croydon and Epsom hospitals each focusing on raising awareness of kidney health. Stands were welcoming and engaging, offering a wide range of information for patients, visitors and staff to take away.

During the day, blood pressure testing was offered, giving visitors the opportunity to 'know their numbers' and understand how blood pressure affects kidney health. A dialysis machine was also available on display, allowing staff to explain how dialysis works and to help demystify treatment for those unfamiliar with renal care.

The day was made even more special by the support of

members from the St Helier and Surrey Kidney Patients Association and Kidney Fund charities, who joined staff at St Helier Hospital. Their involvement brought insightful patient perspectives and highlighted the valuable role that charities play in supporting people living with kidney disease and their families.

All of the stands were extremely well attended, with patients,



visitors and colleagues from other hospital departments welcoming the opportunity to speak directly with renal teams and patient representatives to learn more about kidney health and the support available.

Helen Watts, Divisional Director of Nursing, reflected on the day, saying:

"It was such a great success across all three hospital sites – a real celebration of teamwork and partnership, highlighting the importance of all things kidney-related. I'm so proud of our dedicated teams and the Renal charities for their efforts on the day."





Blood Pressure checks come to the Barbershop!

On Thursday 26 March, an innovative blood pressure (BP) awareness initiative was launched in a place you might not expect – a local barbershop!

The event was led by our very own Dr Pauline Swift, Chair of Blood Pressure UK, alongside Professor Nicky Thomas from London South Bank University. The launch brought together healthcare professionals, community leaders, and local barbers – even featuring a community bishop getting a haircut while having his BP checked!

As part of the initiative, eight barbers have been specially trained to offer on-the-spot blood pressure checks to customers. This approach builds on a successful model previously implemented in Los Angeles, demonstrating how trusted community spaces can play a vital role in early detection and prevention.

The importance of this work cannot be overstated. High blood pressure affects more than one in four adults in England, contributes to over 75,000 deaths each year, and accounts for more than one



in ten GP visits. Despite this, millions of people remain undiagnosed. This initiative is a fantastic example of taking healthcare directly into the community, making it more accessible and helping to reach people who may not routinely engage with traditional health services. A huge well done to Dr Swift and Professor Thomas for leading such an inspiring and impactful project!

Thank you for sharing your experience – Kidney PREM Survey

A huge thank you to all of the 486 patients who completed the annual Kidney Patient Reported Experience Measure (PREM) survey throughout Autumn last year. The PREM survey is a national survey that focuses on patients' experiences of kidney care, such as communication, involvement in decisions, and overall quality of care.

We were delighted to achieve our highest response rate to date, and we are very grateful to everyone who took part. This feedback is vital in helping us understand what matters most to you and where we can work in improvements and continue to do what is working well.

Renal teams across the service have met as a team and reviewed the feedback received for the area

they work in and are developing action plans-based on themes identified from what patients told us and comments received.

Over the coming months, planned actions will be displayed in satellite units and outpatient areas – look out for the 'You Said, We Did' posters coming soon.

The feedback given will help to shape the renal service the future, thank you again to everyone who took part – **Your voice really does matter!**

Greetings Renaliteers,

Every year my father used to say March comes in like a lion and out like a lamb, but this year seems to be an exception. As I write this piece in early April, it's 7° and windy. I'm writing to you from a chilly, poorly lit room in Northern France where I'm attending a European renal meeting. Attending these meetings is important to find out what our colleagues are working on, sharing our results and seeking out new collaborations but I don't really believe in wasting money on fancy hotels.

I'm here to give talk on a project that we've been working on in the Institute for many years where we've been developing a novel method to stop fibrosis, the scarring of the kidney that leads to kidney failure in chronic kidney disease. I first started to develop this idea over 15 years ago. We explored the original hypothesis, we honed the ideas, tested them again and moved forward, step by step. I'd like to thank you for your on-going support, and I should apologise for the slow progress but as you know our resources are limited. Despite this, our ideas are still original and our approach innovative.

I haven't come to the conference

alone. I'm accompanied by **Amir**. Amir is a very promising young researcher. He carried out his MSc research project at the Institute last summer. He stayed on as a research assistant to complete the project and get it ready for publication. This is another idea I've been developing for many years, not quite as long as the project I've written about above. This one is a method of early detection of progressive diabetic kidney disease. Diabetes is the main cause of chronic kidney disease but not all patients follow the same pathway. Most patients with diabetes don't develop kidney disease. Of those who do get diabetic kidney disease, some people have relatively

stable disease whereas others progress more rapidly and require different treatments. It's very difficult to know in advance who will progress more rapidly than others. That where Amir's work comes in, so he's going to present his results here too.

Back at the Institute work continues, including that of our new PhD student. But I'm afraid that will have to wait till next time.

A message from your Chairman

I hope you're all keeping well. I have finished my nineteenth year as Chairman and now I've started my twentieth and final year as Chairman, not bad for someone who said, "I'll do it for a maximum of 5 years". I have agreed to continue until the AGM of 2026, when I will have done 20 years in the role, then it will be time for me to stand down and somebody else to become the Chair. We still need a Treasurer and Secretary. None of these positions require lots of time, overall

probably no more than 1 day a month to keep on top of things.

The KPA committee is trialling meeting every 3 months, both in person and virtually. Anything that needs dealing with in between is done by email or *WhatsApp*. I only visit St Helier about every 4 weeks and it's a very different place to what it was a few years ago, Beacon has been demolished, the inpatient wards have moved to the 6th floor of the main hospital, the servery counter has gone, and outpatients seems so much quieter. I, personally miss the interaction that we used to enjoy with the patients and staff, but times change.

We could certainly benefit from an improved inpatient ward at St Helier, the 6th floor was supposed to be a stopgap between the renal unit and the new build.
